Family Talk Time Celebrating Sunday for Catholic Families: Sara McGinnis Lee
Alert your family that we begin Holy Week today. Palm Sunday is a day of high emotions: happiness and heartbreak. We heard today that Jesus obeyed his Father's will, even when he was scared, and he faced certain death. How do you understand God's will for you?

Reflecting on the Word:

The Palm Sunday liturgy begins and ends in darkness. The same crowds that joyfully welcome Jesus as he enters Jerusalem are to turn against him just a few days later. They will jeer at him and condemn him. They ignore the truth they have seen with their own eyes. How many times have we ignored the Truth that has been revealed to us? Turned a blind eye to the presence of God in our lives? Forsaken the truth and goodness in the face of societal pressure?

Living the Word:

We began Lent by receiving ashes, which were burned from last year's palm branches. Today we begin Holy Week and receive (or will receive) new blessed palms. Look for tutorials online to fashion palms into crosses. You might have your children process through the house singing "All Glory Laud and Honor" (search YouTube for the music and words) or another appropriate hymn. Blessed palms are usually placed over a door or behind a crucifix.

Liturgy Corner by Rev. Robert E. Brassard

Do you know why..... we call celebration of the

Eucharist a memorial? While this is probably not a term that you might use in reference to Mass, it is a very important concept to understand. The concept of memorial, or remembering, has its roots in the Jewish celebration of Passover where the participants make "memory" of the whole saving and liberating action of God in the past. But this is not a "remembering" in our customary understanding of the word. It is not recalling. Rather, it is making present a re-actualization for "today" of something that occurred in the past. Therefore, every time we celebrate the Eucharist, we "make present" the action of Christ. This is what is meant by the words: "Do this in memory of me." The entire Eucharistic Prayer is a memorial—a making present of God's saving deeds in Christ so that their fullness and power take effect here and now. Whenever we celebrate the Eucharist, we not only remember what has been, we also relive what is Christ's continuing work of salvation

Palm Sunday

Patricia Sanchez, *Celebration*

As Matthew's version of the passion and death of Jesus is proclaimed (Gospel). Every evil tendency of humankind will be revealed. We will be told of Judas' betrayal and of Peter's denial. We will listen as the disciples are so oblivious to Jesus that they fall asleep when he needs their support. We will hear the lies told about Jesus, as well as the peoples' mockery of him. We will sense the fierceness of the crowd, the weakness of Pilate and the hypocrisy of the chief priests and elders. Then, in the most horrifying but sacred moment when Jesus gives up his spirit on the cross, the evils of humankind, grave though they are, will be eclipsed by a love that is at once intense and pure. It is this great love of God that has seen Jesus through each of his days and nights. This loving nature of God was reflected in Jesus' gentle way with sinners, in his willingness to welcome children, in his outreach to foreigners and outcasts. God's loving nature was evident each time Jesus healed the sick and forgave sinners. This love was revealed most eloquently at the last supper Jesus shared with his friends, where he gave himself as food. After his death and resurrection, the disciples knew him to be present in the breaking of the bread.

As we celebrate these most holy days, let us remember, as we break open the bread of the word and share the bread of life, that God's nature continues to be revealed to us. May we also live in such a way that God's nature is revealed through us.

Servant Song: (Isaiah 50)

Celebration

In the wake of Jesus' suffering, death and resurrection, those who believed in him came to the realization that the servant songs described the person and mission of Jesus. While most awaited a King who would rally Israel's armies to rout their enemies and reestablish them as a free nation, along came Jesus with an entirely different plan and message. A traditional perspective might regard the cross as a scandal and a suffering messiah as an oxymoron, but the servant songs provided insight and assurance that God's purpose for Israel was being fulfilled in a manner they did not expect. In order to help them to accept a plan that seemed to destroy their hope and shock their sensibilities, the prophet and the servant prayed and preached morning after morning, day after day. Each year, we enter Holy Week and we become reacquainted with the coat of our salvation. We renew our faith and deepen our gratitude for the One in whom the very nature of God continues to be revealed to us.

Servant Hymn: (Philippines 2)

Celebration

By incorporating this pre-Pauline hymn into his letter, Paul captured the essence of Jesus' passion, death and resurrection in one of the most eloquent and profound Christological statements in the Christian scriptures.

Structurally, the hymn exhibits a parabolic rhythm in which Jesus moves from his place at God's right hand and plummets "downward,"

first taking on flesh and blood, then accepting the status of a slave and then descending to an ignominious death on the cross. From those depths, and because of his obedience to the point of death, the Son was exalted, and the movement of the parabola continues "upward," celebrating the resurrection of Jesus into glory. Drawn together and "upward" with Jesus are all those who – by virtue of his incarnation, passion and death – have been delivered from the depths of sin and death. All who are baptized in Jesus' name share his journey from death to life. Because of its emphasis on obedience and a suffering servant who was vindicated by God, some have called this hymn a fifth servant song. By perfectly fulfilling the servant's mission, Jesus received the name "Lord," and is deserving of our faith and grateful adoration.

Called to Follow:

Pat Marrin, *Celebration*

On Palm Sunday, Jesus chose nonviolence, humility and simplicity to challenge the illusion of power. So, must we. Jesus cleansed the temple of commerce and complicity between organized religion and money. So, must we. At the Last Supper: Jesus celebrated his life and death in the pattern of the Paschal Mystery: self-sacrificing love for the common good. So, must we. After his arrest in the garden, Jesus challenged the courts, both sacred and secular, to expose false assumptions and injustice against the innocent. This is our Christian vocation as well. Jesus died on the cross for love, laying down his life for his friends, trusting totally in God to vindicate his cause. He rose from the grave to proclaim that love is greater than death, that truth is a force more powerful than any empire, kingdom or system that advances its own agenda at the cost of human liberation and community.

Our celebration of the gospel is nothing less than a school for learning how to transform the world. Palm/Passion Sunday is a staging area for our mission to the world. Holy Week is our invitation to enter more deeply into the life of Christ, which is our own life and vocation from birth and baptism. Jesus is in the world through us. If we do not imitate him, our world will not know Easter.



Holy Week

It is not always easy to understand these profound mysteries of our faith, but over time we grow in appreciation for our celebrations.

The Triduum

The liturgies of the Triduum can serve as primary teaching tools of the Catholic faith. The time from the Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday through the evening on Easter Sunday is referred to as the "Triduum," meaning three days. These days give us the opportunity to share in the mystery and power of God's love as lived out in the suffering of his son, Jesus. It is helpful to think of these days not as separate celebrations, but as one continuous remembrance in which we meet and follow Jesus.

† HOLY THURSDAY – MASS OF THE LORD'S SUPPER

Exodus 12:1-8, 11-14 – 1 Corinthians 11:23-26 – John 13:1-15

Lent ends with the beginning of the Mass of the Lord's Supper. The reception of the Holy Oils takes place and the Washing of the Feet is celebrated. The Blessed Sacrament is transferred to the place of Reservation. At the conclusion of our Eucharist, we are invited, as were the first disciples, to watch and pray with the Lord on the night before his crucifixion and death. We keep watch, here at the moment of Jesus' greatest need.

† GOOD FRIDAY OF THE LORD'S PASSION

Isaiah 52:13-53:12 – Hebrews 4:14-16, 5:7-9 – John 18:1 – 19:42

The celebration of the Lord's Passion is celebrated with the altar striped of ornamentation and the tabernacle is left open and empty. Mass is not celebrated on this day. The liturgy includes readings, prayers and intercessions followed by the veneration of the cross and concluded with Eucharist, reserved from our Holy Thursday celebration.

† EASTER SUNDAY OF THE RESURRECTION OF THE LORD

The Easter Vigil is a rich moment in time in which we are drawn into Jesus' timeless victory over sin and death that is now ours. It begins near darkness, and then a single candle is lit from the fire—the paschal candle. We will then listen to Scripture readings. When the Gloria is intoned, the lights of the church are turned on, giving a vivid symbol of the light that floods our lives through Jesus. Some of the symbols that make this liturgy so rich are fire, water, oil, light and darkness.
