

FROM FR. TOM'S DESK

Fourth Sunday of Easter: Patricia Sanchez, *Celebration*

Whereas the world might define peace as: (1) the absence of war or other hostilities; (2) freedom from quarrels or disagreements; (3) harmonious relations, it was exceedingly clear that this was not the peace that was and is the legacy of Jesus. Indeed, because of their faith and commitment to him, Jesus' disciples often find themselves the victims of hostility and entangled in conflicts. Because believers are called to live by principles that are unpopular within a culture that ridicules, negates and/or rejects their values, they are frequently and necessarily embroiled in controversy and out of harmony with the status quo. Nevertheless, they are possessed of a peace that supersedes anything the world could ever conceive or negotiate.

Jesus offers the peace of conviction, confrontation, and endurance. No experience of life, no human event can ever rob us of Jesus' peace; no sorrow, no danger, no suffering can ever cause it to diminish. Jesus' peace remains, ever firm, despite the most unpleasant and difficult circumstances, because Jesus' bequest of peace is rooted in the relationship with God that has been afforded each of us through Jesus' dying and rising. Recall the words of the author of Colossians: "...for through Jesus all things are reconciled. He has made peace by the blood of his cross" (1:20).

Jesus' peace enabled the early Christians to deal with the dissensions and controversies that arose among them and remain one church (see first reading, Acts). It was this peace that continues to enable believers to accept, appreciate and reverence diversity and pluralism as beneficial and not detrimental to the unity we share. Not a one time or an occasional gift, Jesus' bequest of peace engages us, each and all, in an ongoing process of peace-making and peaceable living that will come to a climactic culmination when we enter the eternal city of peace, the heavenly Jerusalem (second reading, Revelation). "Peace is my farewell to you; my peace is my gift to you." As the blessed inheritors of Jesus' bequest of peace, we are also its caretakers, its promoters, and its brokers.

United in Faith:(Acts 15) *Celebration*

Some disciples (e.g. Paul, Barnabas and Peter, after the visit to Cornelius' home, etc.) welcomed gentile converts to Christ freely and fully. Other, more conservative Jewish Christians resented the idea that the gentiles should be allowed to "Bypass" the Mosaic law, circumcision and dietary regulations. Consequently, these so-called Judaizers preached an alternate gospel, declaring "unless you are circumcised according to Mosaic practice, you cannot be saved" (v.1) Paul *et al.* rejected this "gospel" as heresy, realizing that such a requirement insinuated that there was something lacking in the saving death of Jesus. He understood that the cross effected the salvation of sinful humankind, not circumcision, not kosher food and not even the most rigorous and meticulous observance of the law. Paul also understood and was adamant in affirming that salvation is not God's gift for a few or for the chosen, nor is it determined by nationality, heritage, or holiness. Faith in Jesus, a faith that is both professed and lived is the sole requisite for salvation and for inclusion as an equal member of the community of the faithful. Faith in Jesus was also to override centuries of heritage and hate as it brought together at the same eucharistic table those who had formerly been called "the chosen" with those who had formerly been regarded as "unclean," "unholy" and "alien": Faith in Jesus must continue to bring together as one all members of the community.

Vision of a New Jerusalem: (Revelations 21) *Celebration*

Unlike its earthly predecessor, the new Jerusalem would have no temple, i.e., no humanly constructed edifice that might tend to limit access to God. In the absence of the temple, there would be no specified priesthood, no prescribed cult or sacrificial system, no separation between the sacred and the human. God's perpetual presence, in and among the citizens of the new Jerusalem will bless the city and all who dwell in it with holiness. Every activity will be permeated by God: The tension between the world and the church will be no more. Glorified humanity will have God shining through it, and Jesus' bequest of peace will at long last be fully realized.

Our Inheritance: (John 14) *Celebration*

Ordinarily, a person's last will and testament is read in the presence of his/her heirs *after* he/she has departed from them in death. However, in the fourth gospel's lengthy last supper discourse (chapters 13-17), the Johannine Jesus is featured as sharing his own final testament with his own *before* being lifted up in death and glory on the cross. In today's gospel pericope, the followers and heirs of Jesus are assured that they will not be left alone: he has anticipated their needs and will bequeath to them the gifts of the divine presence, peace, and the Paraclete. Notice how tenderly Jesus' promise is expressed. To those who love him and are true to his word, he pledges the Father's love and adds "we will come to him and make our dwelling place with him always" (v.33). In other words, Jesus was telling his disciples that they would become living temples, as it were, wherein the very presence of God can be welcomed and encountered by others.

Resurrection Now: Patrick McCormick, *Service*

For the resurrection is more than Lazarus walking out of the tomb or the widow's son rising from his litter. It is more than bringing persons back to life, or even a promise of life after death. Instead, the resurrection represents the fulfillment of all God's covenants and all our hopes. The resurrection is the reconciliation of the terrifying rift between us and God. It is the healing of the chasm of sin and death in such a way that we shall never be left alone as orphans. In the resurrection God breaks through every barrier and fulfills the promise to dwell within our community and in our hearts.

Those of us gathered around this table of the Eucharist hear the promise as powerful as those in the upper room or as the early Christian communities spread around the Mediterranean. The resurrection speaks about the Spirit of God being sent among our communities, to our families and in our world. Our faith in the resurrection is not simple a belief in an event which occurred to other persons over twenty centuries ago, or even an assurance about what will happen to us in the future. We believe in the resurrection as the present experience of the sending of the Spirit and the indwelling of the Father and Son. The resurrection means that here and now we are not alone; That the Spirit of God is with us in our hearts and homes, in our personal lives and in the corridors of our power. The resurrection means that there is no aspect of our lives, no corner of the human experience alienated from or foreign to the love of God. Nothing is beyond the reach of the Spirit. This is the promise of the resurrection. It is a promise Jesus kept. It is a promise Jesus keeps.

Last Weekend for Migrant Ministry!!!


