FROM FR. TOM'S DESK

Feast of the Most Holy Family:

Patricia Sanchez, *Celebration*

The word “theophany” refers to a direct encounter with God. The term is a combination of two Greek words: *theos*, God; and *phainos*, appear. A theophany, experienced by an individual or by a group of persons, is usually described by biblical authors as an event that includes (1) a natural disturbance—such as a storm, an earthquake or a bush burning without being consumed—that signals an unusual or unexpected manifestation of God; (2) a revelation from God, whose presence is somehow communicated and affirmed in the natural disturbance; (3) a response, at once fearful and fascinated, on the part of the one gifted with the theophany; (4) an indication that this theophanic experience has changed everything.

Because of the Trinity, we are forever changed. Our relationship with God is forever different. I am no longer a mere creature. God is not simply the Unmoved Mover or the Intelligent Designer. God is Parent, and I am the beloved child. God is Brother, and I am beloved sister or brother. God is Spirit, and I am alive with the very breath of God.

In today's second reading, Paul speaks of the different ways in which God is manifested to humankind. The great apostle to the gentiles was probably not thinking in trinitarian terms; this doctrine would not be enunciated until centuries later. Nevertheless, there hints at the multi-personal and relational character of God here and in texts like the first reading from Israel's sapiential literature. There, the author of Proverbs portrays Wisdom personified as God's helpmate in creation. Later believers would come to understand that God's Word and Wisdom became flesh and blood in the person of Jesus Christ. This same Jesus would round out the believer's experience of the theophany of three by promising that the gift of the Spirit (Gospel, John) would forever remain with his disciples.

She is God's Gift (Proverbs 8):

Celebration

Wisdom speaks, and her voice is decidedly womanly. Wisdom is a term of feminine grammatical gender in Hebrew (*Hokmah*), Greek (*Sophia*) and Latin (*Sapientia*). Wisdom is featured in the scriptures as mother nurturer, female beloved, hostess and gourmet cook as well as preacher, judge, liberator, and establisher of justice. In this excerpt from Proverbs, Wisdom is revealing herself as the first of God's works, whose origin predates the beginning of the world. She is beside God in the vital act of creating all that is. Wisdom is a beneficent, right-ordering power in whom God delights and by whom God creates; her constant effort is to lure human beings to life.

In its long development, the concept of Wisdom has evolved from being appreciated as a skill; to sagaciousness; to a feminine quality that reveals God's gentle, nurturing nature; to a person in whom the mind, heart and will of God are fully revealed in flesh and blood. Wisdom is celebrated today as God's abiding gift to all who seek to discover his will, her love.

Source of Strength (Romans 5):

Celebration

By mingling the themes of affliction and disappointment with those of hope and endurance in this passage, Paul extends a brotherly helping hand to all who struggle to maintain balance in their lives. When difficulties arise, Paul seems to be saying, do not look solely inside yourselves for some reserve of strength. Rather, look to God, look to Christ, be open to the movement of the Spirit and find the resources you need to go forward. Look to the Christ-event, where God is fully

revealed and there where struggling human beings find the solution to sin, to sadness, to separation.

Living Legacy (John 16):

Celebration

This Spirit, of whom Jesus speaks in today's Gospel, offers each of us a similar strength and sense of purpose. In all we do, the Spirit that is Jesus' living legacy to us guides and motivates, challenges, and chides. The Spirit enabled Jesus' earliest disciples to make sense of the Christ-event, to accept a crucified savior and to pierce the mystery of redemptive suffering and loving self-sacrifice. Once grasped by the Spirit, the first followers of Jesus became preachers and teachers of the Christ-event so that all might know and participate in its gifts. Compelled by the Spirit, they carried the good news throughout the then-known world, and when the time came for them to follow Jesus' path through suffering and death to life everlasting, the Spirit served as their courage and constant companion.

In Threes:

Deacon Dick Folger, *Celebration*

Peter denied Christ three times. Jesus rose on the third day, Jesus told Peter three times to “feed my sheep.” So many things come in threes: Faith, hope, and charity. The magi. Past, present, and future. Priest, prophet, and king. What is it about three that is so powerful?

The triangle has been described as the most durable shape there is. Its three sides and three angles make it a “perfect” figure that will never collapse into another form. Circles might become ovals, for example—but even if you compress them, triangles will always be triangles.

The greatest triangle of all, the Trinity, is what we celebrate today: Our belief they God is three persons in one. We remind ourselves of this mystery every time we cross ourselves and say, “In the name of the Father and Son and of the Holy Spirit.”

A Relational God:

Fr. James Smith, *Celebration*

God is primarily relational. Father, Son, and Spirit are who they are by doing what they do: relate to each other. Then, God creates outside beings to relate to. God relates to rocks and maples and tigers and humans according to their capacity to respond. Absolutely nothing can exist outside of some direct relationship with God.

The relationship with humankind took a definitive step when God promised Abraham that his descendants would have a special covenant with God. And when God revealed himself in the humanity of Jesus. God's future was forever linked with the destiny of humans. God's life is henceforth incomplete without humankind; God's happiness now depends on the happiness of humanity.

That means that God is intensely involved in each person's life. While God watches over the unfolding evolution and the decline of whole civilizations, he also keeps his eye on every individual. God takes responsibility for every single thing that God has created. In the case of humans, God assumed personal responsibility for each one. It's hard to believe that God cares so much about us. But a God who would not die for you is just another self-centered idol.

In His Hands:

A child was afraid to cross a busy street and standing beside his parent he cried for the parent to hold his tiny hand. The parent's arms were already full—a purse, groceries, an umbrella. So, the parent told the child to reach up and take hold of the parent's outstretched finger. But the child refused to cross the street, even with the offer of the parent's finger to hold. “No,” the child protested, “I did not want to hold your hand I want you to hold my hand.” The parent understood, rearranged her load, and offered her child a full hand into which the child's hand slipped confidently. Together they crossed the street.


