Family Talk Time Celebrating Sunday for Catholic Families: Sara McGinnis Lee Have you ever felt jealous of someone for having more than you do? Have you ever felt that you have beentraeted unfairly?

Reflecting on the Word:

In this parable, Jesus is comparing the Kingdom of heaven to a generous landowner who gives the same amount of pay to the workers who came at the end of the day as the workers who were that all day. Our understanding of fairness is in stark contrast to God's abounding generosity. Jesus reminds us that God gives love and grace freely to everyone.

Living the Word:

Create a chore chart for the week. Explain that some days will have more jobs than others. If you have more than one child, alternate their heavy days of chores. Decide on a small reward for the completion of the work, making sure each child receives the same reward no matter the amount or duration of work. Discuss how it makes each child feel to receive the same reward regardless of the work. If one does not have to work as hard, can we rejoice for that person? Or are we jealous? How can we be more generous with others? Sometimes this week, make a list of how we can share our gifts, talents, and time with others.

Twenty-Fifth Sunday in Ordinary Time Patricia Sanchez, Celebration

Today's Gospel and first reading offers believers a glimpse of the mercy of God, which is a mercy without measure and without memory. God deals with sinners with a mercy we could never hope to merit.

Isaiah attributed this quality of mercy to the fact that God is holy and wholly other; God's ways and thoughts are so far beyond human ways and thoughts that they are almost unimaginable. Whereas human beings would punish or take revenge for wrong done, God surprises sinners with generous forgiveness. To that end, the prophet encourages scoundrels and wicked people to turn to God with confidence.

Mercy is also the unnamed virtue that inspired Jesus' parable of the vineyard. Most of us would bristle at what appears to be an injustice perpetrated on hard-working people. But the key to understanding the parable is in the first sentence. It is more than a story about a vineyard. The parable teaches a lesson about the kingdom of heaven. Entrance to the kingdom cannot be earned, no matter how early one rises or how one works. Entrance is God's gift, given freely and mercifully to those who seem by human standards to deserve it, as well as to those who do not. Generous mercy is that quality of God without which we would have no hope of survival.

The Generosity of God: (Isaiah 55)

Celebration

During their exile, the displaced peoples of Judah had survived the fall of Jerusalem, the ruination of the Temple and the cessation of their sacrificial cult. But they were challenged to use that time to grow closer to God and to one another, rather than squander their time and energies hating their Babylonian oppressors. Instead of crying out for revenge or cursing their enemies, they were to use those years to learn how to forgive as God had forgiven them. The limitless forgiveness of God defies all human boundaries. While we may accept this truth eagerly, it is quite another challenge to emulate God's ways. We cannot evaluate God's responses by the same vardstick we use to measure normal human reactions. When such a measure was applied to the Matthean Jesus (today's Gospel), he left his disciples with a question that continues to challenge us: "Are you envious because I am generous?"

Fearless Paul: (Philippians 1)

Celebration

When Paul wrote to his beloved friends in Philippi, he was also in prison (probably in Ephesus), and he was aware that his incarceration might end in his death. But Paul did not dread death, innocent though he was; he welcomed it as the passage through which he would travel to be with Christ forever. By his own admission, Paul felt torn and conflicted: "I am caught between the two. Paul was standing at the brink of death, with toes curled over the edge, and he needed to speak about it with trusted friends. In verse 22, Paul implied that dying or not dying was somehow his choice. Perhaps we can better appreciate Paul's state of mind if we interpret this statement as his willingness to take the initiative and walk into his own future, to embrace rather than resist necessity and to be on top rather than beneath his situation. He talks as one who has done it and is free.

God's Gift: (Matthew 20)

In his commentary on this uniquely Matthean parable, Karl Rahner said that this Gospel appears more incomprehensible each time it is read. How difficult it is to appreciate the incalculable mercy of Godthat good grace which cannot be tallied up in terms of wages and

justice; that generosity which ultimately colors every divine thought, word and deed. God gives us all we are and all we have. God gives us our very selves, explained Rahner, and whenever we complain that God has treated others better, we are, in effect, refusing to accept our own selves as God's good gift. This parable invites us to admit that we are those laborers who receive the daily wage, i.e., the denarius. Indeed, we ourselves are the denarius.

Jealous or Not:

Deacon Dick Folger, Celebration Today's Gospel tells about how, in our greed, we can perceive other people's money as our own. The all-day workers could easily feel that they should get more than the latecomers. But the generous landowner saw it differently : It was his money to give.

It is not unlike the story of a robbery that took place in our nation's capital. Late one night, a mugger wearing a ski mask popped out of the bushes in front of a well-dressed congressman who was taking a stroll through the park. The mugger stuck his gun into the lawmaker's ribs and demanded, "Give me your money."

Indignantly the congressman protested, "You can't do this to me. I am a politician!" The mugger quickly retorted: "In that case, give me my money!"

Parables Point: Fr. James Smith, Celebration Jesus is a realist. He understands that he cannot construct a different reality with the same old pieces. The poor will always be with us; the strong will abuse the weak; and in the end, everyone dies. What Jesus tries to do with parables is to give us glimpses of a better, kinder life. Parables are a kind of non-sense to make us wonder whether life makes sense.

The kingdom of heaven is like a priest who tried to explain parables. Some listened a lot, some a little. They all died, went to heaven and Saint Peter said: "The kingdom of heaven is like...this!"

On Loving:

Fr. James Smith, Celebration

In a burst of love, God created humans with a loving spirit who could love back. Later, at just the right time, God so loved the world that he sent his own son-not to condemn the world but to love it. The Son was a chip off the old block; he loved unconditionally, indiscriminately, uncontrollably. But since humankind can stand only so much love, it got rid of God's Love Child by crucifying him.

This was surely more than grounds for divorce. But no, God used the occasion to seal the marriage covenant between God and his people with the blood of his Son. Then God raised his Son from this dangerous earth to the haven of heaven.

This is the consummate love story So how did we get lost in the subplots of law and sin and judgement? For the same reason we find the generous landowner so unbelievable. Because justice is easier to manage than mercy. Because it is easier to be legal than loving. Because to love is to give up control of our destiny.

But if we do not trust love, we cannot trust God-who is love.
