

Has anyone ever declined your invitation? How did that make you feel? God is always inviting us to come to him. How do we respond to this invitation?

Reflecting on the Word:

In this parable, God is presented as a king preparing a wedding feast for his son. Many were invited, but they all rejected the invitation, through indifference or hostility. The king then opened the banquet to everyone—good and bad alike. In the same way, God invites us all to the table, but some reject the invitation. Those who are accepting and prepared for God's Word are worthy of the offer of salvation.



Living the Word:

Together, make a list of all the ways you can be ready to prepare for God's presence in your life. How can your heart be ready? How can your mind be ready? How can your hands be ready? This week, before bed, make a list of ways God was active throughout the day. Did you talk to people with kindness? Did you try to think as Jesus would? Did you see the good in people? How does preparing for God's presence help you be more welcoming to the love of Jesus throughout your day?

Twenty-Eighth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Patricia Sanchez, *Celebration*

Last Sunday, as we listened as Paul told the Philippians to “Think on these things.” “These things” referred to all that is true, honorable, just, pure, lovely, gracious, excellent and worthy of praise. Paul understood that those things which occupy our minds also direct and inspire our words and works. By keeping these good things foremost in mind and heart, believers will become more attuned to the invitations and overtures of God as these reveal themselves among us.

At times, these invitations are quite overt and readily recognizable, as in today’s first reading and Gospel. Both texts feature a banquet hosted by God; invitations have been extended, and it devolves upon those invited to avail themselves of the opportunity or not. Similar invitations are extended to each of us on a regular basis. Weekly liturgical celebrations in our home parishes and congregations reach out and invite us to come together to celebrate the blessings of God. Rich fare is available to all; free for the taking is the bounteous feast here, and the feasting table will never be empty. As long as there are those who hunger for God, God will be there to satisfy all.

But we are free to accept these invitations and to avail ourselves of these weekly banquets, or not. Our responsiveness will depend on how sensitive we are to recognize the movements of God; our sensitivity will be proportionate to the quality of our thoughts and ideas. Think on these things, advises Paul. Then your hungers will be genuine; your values will be true; your priorities will be duly aligned, and you shall recognize God’s invitations to you.

A Place at the Table: (Isaiah 25)

Celebration

This pericope introduces a theme popular among the ancient Israelites and prepares the praying assembly to welcome today’s Gospel. Just as the vineyard motif (last Sunday) was a standard symbol for the people of Israel, banquet imagery was an apt metaphor for describing God’s salvific love. In an arid land where most of the population scraped by with the minimum of basic necessities, a free banquet of rich food and choice wines was tantamount to paradise. The banquet would be located on a mountain, the special locus of God’s presence. It would also provide an opportunity for forgiveness and healing. Death would be destroyed, and this fact affirms beyond a doubt the messianic character of this dining experience.

When Jesus began to exercise his messianic ministry, he drew upon this rich banquet tradition in order to describe God’s coming reign. Some of his contemporaries thought they were assured places of honor at God’s banquet because of their meticulous study and implement of the law. Jesus challenged their presumptuous by his actions and through his choice of table companions. Dining with the poor and the outcasts of his society, Jesus indicated that God’s invitation was extended to all. A place at the tables could not be earned; it was God’s to give and, if necessary, to revoke.

Pleasing Support: (Philippians 4)

Celebration

Most scholars agree that these words of Paul were prompted by the monetary support the Philippians sent to him in prison. Usually Paul did not accept such gifts, choosing rather to support himself and to take no recompense for the ministry he loved. But the Philippians were special to Paul, and for them he made an exception. Unfortunately, verses 18-19, in which Paul describes their gift as “a sacrifice pleasing to God” and as “a share in his hardships,” have been omitted from today’s text. Had these verses been included, believers would better appreciate how strong was the partnership between Paul and his converts in Philippi, who supported his work as best they could. Because they shared his ultimate concern, their efforts on his behalf were a pleasing sacrifice that eased Paul’s hardships and gave glory to God.

Requested response: (Matthew 22)

Celebration

The second parable of the wedding garment probably circulated independently at first; this explains the lack of continuity with the first parable. Isn’t it logical that a person called in from the streets would not have a festal garment to wear?

No doubt the evangelist appended the parable here in order to affirm believers’ responsibility for responding to God’s call to salvation (the great feast of the kingdom) by cooperating with the grace God extends. Perhaps the wedding garment alluded to baptism, when believers put on the Lord Jesus Christ; their new life in Christ is symbolized by a white garment. The person in the parable without the proper attire could represent those who did not live up to their commitment, although they were invited to the feast of God’s reign and were baptized. Through the harsh treatment of the ill-dressed guest, the Matthean Jesus, the evangelist and his church warn against becoming lax or taking the invitations of God for granted.

Each day, the very fact that we awaken and are still breathing, is in itself an invitation to live that day as our response to the God who loves us. In little things and in large things, all we do and all we say constitutes our RSVP to God.

God’s Invitation:

The 20th- century theologian Paul Tillich described a person’s god as their “ultimate concern.” Whatever is most important to us is our god. What is our *god*?

Perhaps one way of answering this question is to consider how we respond to God’s many invitations in our lives. Some of those are standing invitations that invite us to gather regularly for liturgy. These weekly or even daily invitations can become so routine that we might not be fully present at the banquet of word and bread and fellowship.

God’s invitations reveal themselves in other ways as well. Through the persons who reach out to us in their need, God invites us to share. Through those who suffer injustice, God invites our advocacy and responsible participation at the ballot box. Through those who have no one to speak for them, no one to uphold their rights to live and work without fear, God invites our persistent involvement on their behalf.

In the beauties of nature, God invites our awe and admiration; in the calamities of nature, God invites our trust. In the warmth of friendship and familial harmony, God invites our gratitude; in the pain and turmoil of strained relationships, God invites our perseverance. In the vigor of our youth and good health, God invites our grateful service; in the pain of sickness and the struggles of old age, God invites our endurance and calm. In all our fears, in all our frustrations, in all our sadness, desires, accomplishments and joys, God is inviting us to be at peace and center upon the One who is to be our ultimate concern.
