The Second Sunday in Ordinary Time

Celebration

As “ordinary” time begins for another liturgical year as well as another calendar year, the attention of the assembly continues to focus on Jesus as the servant of God, empowered by God and sent by God to be the light and salvation of the nations. In today’s gospel, the Isaian Servant theme is reprised; like his fellow evangelists, John understood that the Servant’s mission was accomplished in Jesus.

While both Isaiah and John keep our eyes on the fact of Jesus’ being called and consecrated by God for the service of salvation, Paul, in the introduction to his Corinthian correspondence challenges his readers to turn their gaze inward. Like Christ, each of us has also been called by God and consecrated, i.e., set apart for service, set apart that we might set the world afire with the good news that *all* are loved and saved by God. Indeed, what has been said of God’s Servant must also be true of us. We, like the Isaian Servant and like Jesus, are to allow the glory of God to shine forth in us. By virtue of our baptism, which, you will recall, the early church described as the sacrament of *enlightenment or illumination*. We are, each of us, individually and together as a community to become light.

Reason for Hope:(Isaiah 49)

Celebration

This song is the second of the four servant songs attributed to the sixth-century B.C.E. Deutero-Isaiah, who shared his people’s exile in Babylonia. Like the others, the song we hear today was intended to offer hope to the Israelites. As interpreted by the prophets, their circumstances as exiles were the direct consequences of their political failures; the prophets also decried the people of Judah for falling short of the ethical, social and moral challenges demanded by their covenantal relationship with God. For that reason, their deliverance was not conceived of as a political victory but as reconciliation with a forgiving God who would restore them to their own land and way of life.

As grim as their situation was, the promises of God were always greater, and the fact that God always delivered on those promises was a source of comfort and strength. For that reason, during the exile and its aftermath, the atmosphere among the Jewish people was rife with messianic expectation, not necessarily for a servant who would suffer (see the third and fourth songs) but for someone who would restore Israel, be a light to the nations and extend God’s salvation to the ends of the earth.

Union in Christ: (1 Cor.1)

Paul never ceased to remind his converts and his readers that their union *en Christo*, or “in Christ.” Was more important than any other relationship. A term he would use some 165 times in his correspondence, “in Christ” (v.2) signified a personal relationship with Christ that was so all encompassing that it empowered the believer to become *like* Christ. Being in Christ and being like Christ, the followers of Jesus have the potential to be transformed by Christ for the better. When lived out in the context of community, this process of transformation can be contagious. Community members can become, by their own good example, the impetus that challenges others to grow and change as well. Then, like a chain reaction, believers can become a catalyst for the transformation of all humankind.

Lamb of God: (John 1)

Celebration

As for the title Lamb of God, it seems to have been the evangelist’s intent that his readers call to mind three such lamb figures that were featured in their sacred literatures. First, the title recalled the paschal lamb; according to the tradition recorded in the book of Exodus (12:6-13). Second, the title recalled the figure of the Suffering Servant, described in the fourth song by Isaiah as an innocent, oppressed and condemned lamb who would give his life as an offering for sin (Isaiah 53:7-10). Finally, the title Lamb of God referenced the figure of a lamb featured in Jewish apocalyptic literature; though slain, this lamb conquered sin (Revelation 5:6), became the source of life-giving water (Revelation 7:17; 22:1) and ransomed humankind by its blood (Revelation 5:9). By featuring the Baptizer acclaiming Jesus as Lamb of God, the Johannine evangelist has offered his readers a full blown description of his saving mission, as the lamb by whose blood sinners are delivered from death, as the innocent one who has borne the guilt of the many and the victorious lamb who has forever conquered sin.

At every eucharistic liturgy, the praying assembly raises its collective voice and three times calls upon Jesus as Lamb of God. What John the Baptizer announced near the Jordan over two millennia ago, we continue to celebrate: Jesus is the Lamb of God who takes away sin and who grants us peace. In his mercy and in that peace, we are privileged to live our lives, set apart by grace and set afire by love for the sake of the world and in the service of the word.

Share the Fire:

In the cold mountain regions of northern India, where the temperatures can drop dangerously low, travelers are helped to keep warm in this way. They take a small vessel that contains burning coal and cover it up. They weave strings around it and after wrapping it in a cloth, carry it close to them. On one occasion, three men were traveling thus toward the sacred place of Amarnath. One of them saw several other travelers suffering with cold; so he took the coal out of his vessel and lit a fire so that everyone could get warm. Everyone left that place alive.

When it grew dark, the second man of the three took the burning coal out of his vessel and lit a torch with it. By its light, all could the path and all traveled on in safety. The third man of the party mocked the other two and said “You are fools, you have wasted your faire for the sake of others.”

“Show us your fire,” they said to him. When he broke open his vessel, there was no fire, no light, no warmth—only ashes and spent coal. With his fire, one had given warmth to others and another had given light. But the third man was selfish and kept the fire to himself. In the end, it was of no use, not even to him.

In the same way, It is God’s will that the fire of the Holy Spirit that we receive should give warmth and light to others and help them to be saved.
