

watch for Jesus today?



As parents, we must stay awake with late-night feeding, with a sick child, or waiting for a teenager to return home from an evening out with friends. Although we are tired, we are alert for our children's needs. We are asked to have that same

kind of alertness about our spiritual life. God has given us the responsibility as His servants. We know he is coming. How do we keep our eyes open? How do we keep our hearts open, ready for His return?

Living the Word:

Father Marc's Minutes...

Happy New Year

I want to wish everyone a very happy new year! This weekend we officially inaugurate a brand-new liturgical year. Advent is a time of active participation where we intensely wait for the Lord Jesus' coming at Christmas. How can we be active and wait at the same time? Isn't waiting a purely passive exercise? To answer these questions, I want to use the analogy of the watchmen standing on top of the castle walls. On the surface their job sounds boring. They must spend the entire night or day just standing in one area while keeping their guard up for potential adversaries. The secret to the entire exercise is to always be scanning the horizon and resist the urge to become complacent. That is how the season of Advent can be transformative and make a difference for our celebration of Christmas. Advent is a specific time to establish habits of gratitude, prayer, self-reflection, and silence so that we notice and respond to the promptings of the Holy Spirit. This season of Advent we will also usher in some changes during the liturgy. I want to

The first change has to do with the Book of the Gospels. The first half of mass is called the Liturgy of the Word. This part of the mass we hear from the scriptures and hear our Christian story. We encounter the power of story to transform our hearts and touch our minds. We are reminded of who we are by recounting the stories that inform our identity. The second Vatican council called us to immerse ourselves in God's word. While all the scriptures are holy, the Gospels stand out. They explicitly talk about Jesus' life, teachings, and mission while on earth. We honor them with our physical posture by standing when the gospel is proclaimed. Another way we can honor the gospels is by using a particular book that is decorated and stands out in beauty. The lector will process in with the Book of the Gospels and place it on the altar. The book is carried high and proudly into the sanctuary.

Parish Reconciliation Service

I want to talk a little bit about our parish reconciliation service during Advent. We will celebrate this wonderful sacrament on Sunday, December 10th at 2pm. This service will not be a communal reconciliation/penance service. I know this is a change from the past, and so I want to explain it. However, I cannot explain everything

in this one article. Today and for the weeks leading up to December 10th. I will break down the sacrament, its scriptural basis, and the practical aspects of celebrating the Sacrament of Reconciliation.

In this section I want to talk about what is a sacrament and the aspects of this sacrament. One simple but deep definition of a sacrament is that a sacrament is a visible sign, instituted by Christ, to give us grace. The sacraments also affect what they signify. In other words, the symbol becomes reality. For example, in Baptism the symbol is a cleansing of sin and death and rebirth. Saint Paul makes that abundantly clear when he says we were buried with Christ in Baptism and rise to new life. The pouring of water over the head or immersion is a symbol of this cleansing and rebirth. However, because of the power and nature of a sacrament, there is a substantial and real cleansing that takes place in Baptism. The sacraments are visible signs that use physical matter such as water, words, hand gestures, oil, and more. Secondly, all sacraments flow through the connection to Christ. Christ is the bridge between God and man. Why did God give us the sacraments? He gave them to us so that we may receive God's own life, God's help, and be divinized or transformed more into Christ.

That is a crash course on sacraments. The sacrament of Reconciliation is aimed at forgiveness of sin, both mortal (serious and grave) and venial (less serious), and thereby restoration of the individual to God and the church. This restoration is done by having contrition for our sins, confessing them to a priest, and performing a penance to demonstrate our desire for conversion. The discipline for this sacrament has always involved a verbal confession of sin, performing a penance, and having contrition. In the early church the confession of sins and performing a penance were more public. Over time and especially due to the rise of monastic life, the discipline shifted to a private confession and more personal interaction with the priest. General confession and absolution are a practice allowed by canon law but is reserved for exceptional circumstances where people do not have access to the sacrament or to be used in extreme emergencies. However, even when this is legitimately done, the law expects that the person goes to individual confession at their next opportunity. Due to these reasons, we will not be having communal confession. The reconciliation services will look like this: gathering with song, reflecting on God's mercy with some scriptures, a communal examination of conscience, then time for individual confession with a priest, and finally giving thanks to God together at the

end. To receive sacramental absolution or forgiveness

from your sins, you will need to go and talk to a priest.
