Financial Peace University:



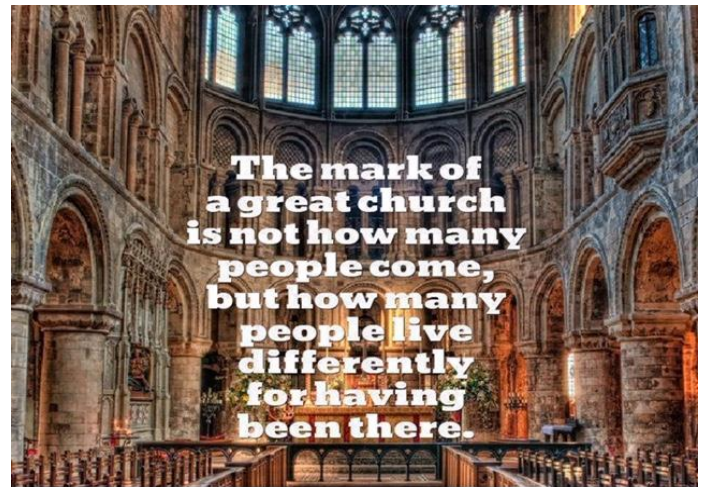

Third Sunday of Advent

One of December's most popular versions of ambiguous adages says, "Put Christ back in Christmas," a maxim that seems to presume that we have the ability to put Christ wherever we wish.

This brings us back to John the Baptist, the prophet whom Jesus called the greatest person ever born of a woman. We hear John today as he languishes in prison and hears about Jesus. Wondering what he's risked his life for, he sends disciples to scrutinize Jesus and his mission. John sent his disciples to ask the most important question of his life: "Are you the *One* to come or should we look for another?"

Jesus didn't give a straight answer. He responded: "Go tell John what you hear: tell him what you've seen in the healing of people who were blind, lame, deaf and leprous. Tell John that the poor are rejoicing. Tell him, "Blessed are those who see the hand of God in this!"

Jesus' response transformed the interrogator into the interrogated. Instead of answering John's question, Jesus' recital questioned John about his expectations. Jesus asked what grounded his hope and oriented his discernment.

Jesus' resume fulfilled all Isaiah's signs of God's coming into the human milieu. For John, who could probably recite Isaiah 35 from memory, there was a hidden message of consolation to boot. The section of Isaiah that Jesus quoted also said, "Strengthen the hands that are feeble...say to those whose hearts are frightened: 'Be strong, fear not! Here is your God.'"

What more could Jesus have said to support someone imprisoned by Herrod?

Isaiah's Promise (Isaiah 35):

Celebration

Isaiah's prophecy talks about the world's return to how things should be. The fearful will be encouraged, and the weak will find strength, all because they realize that God is with them. They will recognize how God has been with them all along, saving them even when they thought they were lost. Further signs of the great transformation will be restoration of those whose life had been marred by injury or affliction. The blind will see, the deaf will hear and the lame will dance like a deer to the tune sung by the once mute. Those are the signs of the salvation brought by our God. What may not occur to westerners about this vision is that it is thoroughly communal. The salvation God promises is not an individual heavenly experience but the restoration of a community. The community that desires this dream is one in which the seeing long for others to enjoy sight, the strong do not lord it over the weak but carry their burdens. This is a community that wants to sing with the harmony that can only result from the full contribution of every voice. Those who long for this restoration are truly longing for the reign of God – and as Jesus said in Matthew 5:6, those who hope for righteousness will be blessed with their fill. This is the promise Isaiah foretells.

Like a Farmer (James 5):

Celebration

What do farmers and prophets have in common, and why would James hold forth their examples for his readers to emulate? Both are cultivators. Both plant seeds and hope for growth. Farmers plant seeds of fruits and vegetables in an effort to provide for themselves and their families. Prophets also plant, in that they preach the word of God in the hope that, like a seed, it will take root in the human heart and bring about good and graced growth.

Both professions require a wellspring of patience because once it is planted, the seed's successful growth is out of their hands. Farmers

must wait and hope that the rains that come in the spring and the fall will provide enough (but not to much) rain to ensure a successful yield. Prophets also must wait and patiently hope that the seed that they have sown will be sufficiently "watered" by the faith of those to whom they preach. From these two planters of seeds, James invited his readers to learn patience to wait for the coming Lord.

Prophecy Fulfilled (Matthew 11):

Celebration

Following his interchange with John's disciples, Jesus made one of the more definitive and audacious statements of his entire ministry. Praising John, he called him "more than a prophet," saying he was greater than anyone born of a woman. At the same time, making a clear distinction between the past and present, Jesus went on to say "the least in the kingdom of heaven is greater than he." This was not a put down of John but the announcement that something new was happening.

Jesus represented God's definitive intervention in human history. The time of prophecy, the time of waiting had come to an end. From Moses through John, the prophets had talked about God. In Jesus, God had come to dwell among the people. With the culmination of Jesus' life in his death and resurrection, God would be as fully revealed as will ever happen in human history. The least of those who recognize that truth have received a greater revelation than John.

Ask the Question:

Celebration

As the question of John the Baptizer is repeated in our hearing today, we are challenged to make our own. We too are obliged to ask, "Are you the one who is to come, or should we look for another?" We are to hear the answer with which Jesus deflected the misplaced expectations of his contemporaries. We are to discover in Jesus' answer the mind of God, for whom salvation means healing, not conquest, and service rather than power. If we accept Jesus' answer – as did John and Peter, Paul and so many others – then we too are called to do as Jesus did and hold out against those who would force messianism into a mold and salvation into a neat legalistic formula.

Jesus himself called "blessed" those who could embrace his purpose and ministry without taking offense at him. That blessing sanctified the work of his first disciples. That blessing reaches out with grace and power to embrace believers who today attempt to live and love and serve as Jesus did.

Preparing a Welcome: *Celebration*

Joy was the Hallmark of Jesus' approach of life. Oh, He got angry, frustrated, sad. He was human, after all. But through His life also ran a current of joyful optimism. People could change. Death was not the end. Love was the purpose of living. God was personally involved with each of us. In this very busy season, is there room in your life for joy? If not, you may be missing out on the real gift God wishes to give you. Take time to let Him show you how to claim it for yourself and your family.
