FROM FR. TOM'S DESK

Eighteenth Sunday (Ordinary Time)

Our Liturgy of the Word begins with the depressing cry, "Vanity of vanities! All things are vanity!" That's the refrain Qoheleth, a skeptical teacher of wisdom, uses to begin and end his reflection on the worth of human endeavors.

This sets the stage for the Gospel story in which feuding brothers ask Jesus to judge between them, only to hear him expose the pathetic silliness of their ambitions. It's easy to miss Luke's irony in this tale. The two brothers are fighting over an inheritance. That means that someone, presumably their father, has died and that nothing he ever possessed is now of any value to him.

But the bickering brothers ignore the lesson of Dad's demise and invest all their energy into acquiring the stuff that his death had rendered meaningless to him.

These readings, including Paul's suggestion that we "put to death, then, the parts of you that are earthly," could be pretty depressing on a Sunday morning in August. On the other hand, they might be perfect for a relaxing hour in the shade, sitting on a beach, or contemplating the mountains or clouds.

Today's Scriptures invite us to think realistically about "earthly things," about vanities, about bequests, about bigger barns and storage facilities.

Whether we picture our deathbed, think about the futility of a dead man's big barns, or simply sit to appreciate the grandeur of nature, these August days are made for more than busyness and stuff. Let's make time for the long view.

Pessimistic View (Ecclesiastes 1 and 2)

For the fifth-century author known as Qoheleth, human existence was regarded as vanity because of its futility. For all his hard work and all her toil what, in the end, do human beings have to show for their efforts? *Nada*, said Qoheleth, i.e., vanity. Qoheleth understood life as an endless round of events, some important, some less so, that in the end produce nothing new but merely repeat themselves playing out yet another round of events. Since work is laborious and the round of events is predictably repetitive, the ancient thinker did not see any point in making long-range plans. Rather, Qoheleth recommended living in the moment, for all too soon, another will enjoy the shade of the seedling you planted and where shall you be? Here today; gone tomorrow – a puff of wind that is no more.

Although Qoheleth seemed to have traveled in the dark for most of his life and although his message needs to be balanced by other voices from scripture, Qoheleth makes us think and, in itself, this is a valuable contribution.

The Things Above (Colossians 3)

Just as Qoheleth was influenced by his life experience and the time in which he lived, so was the author of the letter to the believers in Colossae. Because of Jesus – his presence, his ministry, his preaching, his passion, death, and resurrection – those who appropriated the gift of salvation by faith had an entirely new outlook on life. Through Jesus, the ancient author affirmed God's involvement in creation and with all of human-kind. No longer was life regarded as a brief span of years that was halted forever by death. Nor was life to be regarded as a *means* of salvation. On the contrary, Christian life in Christ was appreciated as a *consequence* of salvation. In this

excerpted text, the Colossians author was intent upon affirming how the grace of salvation is to be reflected in the believer's daily existence.

Proper Priorities (Luke 12)

When Luke recounted this parable for his contemporaries, he was intent upon sharpening their preparation for the coming of the kingdom of God. Because decades had passed since Jesus promised that he would return, it was imperative that believers not lose hope or forget the lessons he had taught them. With eyes set on God and with hands and heart dedicated to the service of others, believers are to live each day as if it were their last.

Believers are also to learn how to use their possessions in a manner that frees them so that they are able to accept God's gifts as well as benefit the needy. None of us earns God's gifts. The poor cannot buy them with their poverty, nor can the rich with their riches. All is gift, but in order to be able to receive, your hands and heart cannot be full of other things. You cannot make room for God if all your rooms are full. You cannot follow God if you are not free to go. Therefore, let us take care to find our true and lasting treasure in God alone.

Let me seek, Lord, that which lasts forever.

In Leo Tolstoy's famous short story, "How Much Land Does a Man Need?" a peasant makes a deal – for 1,000 rubles, the peasant can have all the land he can circle in one day. But if he does not make it back to the starting point by sunset, he will lose his money and receive no land. In a thrilling finish to the story, the peasant is racing against the setting sun. He was greedy and tried to cover too much area. He drops dead from exhaustion just short of the finish line. The peasant is buried in an ordinary grave, only six feet long, thus ironically answering the question posed in the title of the story.

Who will I be when I stand before you with empty hands?

Please help me to gradually open my hands and discover that I am not what I own, but what you want to give me.

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
