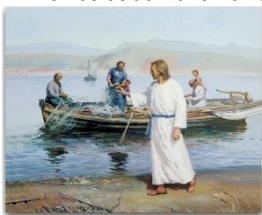

What are fishermen? What do they do? What does it mean to be a fisher of people?

Reflecting on the Word:

Jesus begins his ministry in Galilee by proclaiming to all: "Repent and believe in the Gospel."

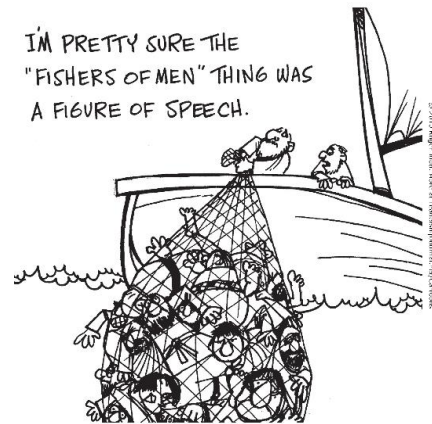
He calls us to pay attention, to listen, and to believe what Jesus is saying. He calls us all to repent--to change how we think, what we believe, and how we live. He calls us for a renewal of our minds and hearts to follow him. These four fishermen left their entire lives behind to become Jesus' disciples. How might we "catch" people and help them to follow Jesus? How can we change how we think and live in order to follow Jesus?



Living the Word:

Help your children draw fish shapes on construction paper and cut them out. On each fish shape, write on simple way that your family can better follow the Gospel (read the bible together, pray, participate in a service project and so on). Attach a paperclip to each fish. Make a fishing pole using a yardstick and attach a length of string and a magnet to one end. This week have your children "fish" for a way to live out the message of this Gospel. Scatter the fish upside-down and each day catch one of them. Then do that activity together.

FROM FR. TOM'S DESK

Third Sunday in Ordinary Time Patricia Sanchez, *Celebration*

Today, the church puts before the gathered assembly readings that are fraught with a sense of urgency and immediacy as regards the call to conversion. Jonah, in the first reading, having been sent by God to Nineveh, informed its inhabitants that they had *forty years* to repent of their sins and reorient their lives toward God. In his correspondence with his Corinthian converts (second reading) Paul urged that they make their best possible use of the *short* time they had to bring their words and works into conformity with the ways and will of God. In the Gospel, Mark presents Jesus appearing in Galilee to proclaim the *imminence* of the reign of God and to call the world to repentance and belief. In summoning his first disciples, Jesus indicated that their willing response to him (“they immediately abandoned their nets and became his followers.” Mark 1:18) would also necessitate a prompt a reorientation of their lives (I will make you fishers of people.” v. 17) As these readings are proclaimed in our hearing, Jonah, Paul and Mark seem to be speaking with one voice, reminding each of us that God’s calls to conversion are to be answered promptly and with a thoroughgoing willingness to change, to grow, and to become more truer images of the God in whose likeness we have been created. As always, these voices from our shared heritage also challenge us to examine the quality of our personal responses to God and the authenticity of our attempts at conversion. They invite each of us to consider what we might do if only forty days stood between us and the moment of our ultimate reckoning before God.

Story with a Purpose: (Jonah 4) *Celebration*

A didactic fiction, Jonah was probably written post-exilic Judah (ca. 400-200 B.C.E.) when the people’s efforts to rebuild and re-establish themselves resulted in extreme nationalism. In an effort to combat the parochialism of his contemporaries, the ancient, anonymous author created the person of Jonah, in whom they were to see a reflection of their own xenophobia. Through the caricature of Jonah with all his shortcomings, the postexilic Israelites were encouraged to examine their own hearts and, like the Ninevites in the story, repent of whatever kept them from sharing fully in God’s salvific love.

Time is Passing: (1 Corinthians 7) *Celebration*

In his letters to the first Christian churches, Paul elaborated on the basic imperatives of the Gospel, *repent* and *believe*, in a manner that helped his readers apply these imperatives to their everyday lives. At the time of his writing to the Corinthians, ca.57 C.E., believers regarded the second coming of Jesus as an imminent reality. Therefore, the call to repent and believe was, all the more urgent.

To that end, Paul warned that “the time is running out” (v.29) and “the world in its present form is passing away” (v.31). Proper preparation for the end would require believers to anticipate the life of the world to come and focus on lasting realities rather than short-term investments and transient activities. Such a focus would mean a certain detachment from this world’s concerns, so as to be fully invested in the reality that would endure forever: their relationship with Jesus in the everlasting reign of peace and glory.

Basic Message: (Mark 1) *Celebration*

Like John, who was his herald, and the prophets who preceded him, Jesus preached repentance. The repentance Jesus called for was not merely the admission of guilt or a sense of sorrow for one’s sinfulness. It was far more challenging than that. If scholars are correct and the first Gospel was originally communicated in Aramaic, Jesus would have used the term *shubh*, which meant to return to

God by turning away from all else. When translated into Greek, *shubh* becomes *meta-noiein*, i.e., a radical change of heart, a complete about-face, a resolve to reorient our entire mindset and lifestyle toward God and Jesus. The challenge to believe in the Gospel is intrinsic to that reorientation. Guilt and regret are not enough; repentance, to be authentic and sustained, must be translated into a faith that we profess with our life as well as our lips. In this way, the repentant believer becomes an integral, living aspect of the good news through which salvation has come to sinners.

God of Second Chances: *Grace Works*

But for all his mistakes, God does not give up on Jonah. Go back to the first verse of our scripture lesson today. Did you notice? After he tried running away from God, after the storm, after the fish, while Jonah was sitting in his pile of seaweed on the beach, “the word of the Lord came to Jonah a *second time*.” Isn’t that a wonderful phrase, “a second time”? Aren’t you glad God doesn’t give up on us after we fail? What chance would any of us have if we were benched from God’s team after our first strike out? But no, that is not the way God works. Even Jonah knew this profound truth about God, that He was “a gracious God and merciful, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love, and always ready to relent from punishing” (Jonah 4:20). That very quality about God was the source of Jonah’s resentment, because he knew God might forgive the Assyrians if they repented. But it did not occur to Jonah that this same mercy of God was all that kept this flop of a prophet from felling the wrath of God too. He stood in the same need of grace as the Assyrians and received God’s unmerited love on just the same basis.

The Kingdom of God: *Celebration*

Today’s reading from Mark is like a Gospel in miniature, Mark frames John’s arrest as the decisive end of the old and the beginning of the new. Jesus began his preaching saying “The time...is at hand.” This “time” is *Kairos*: the definitive time, not a season of the liturgical year or a lunar month, but the time of fulfillment. There has never been a time like this.

The kingdom of God is a reality that springs from relationship with Jesus of Nazareth. It is a state of heart and mind that comes from getting caught up in his vision of life. The kingdom of God is a way of living and thinking, a radically new orientation toward existence. It affects absolutely everything about a person’s life.

Everyone who heard Jesus was called to recognize the *Kairos* and make the decision for or against his message. Everyone who Accepted him was called to learn a new way of living, a new way of hoping, a new way of understanding life and even death itself.


