Reflecting on the Word:



Today's Gospel reminds us of the importance of two words: trust and humility. Simon and his coworkers put their trust in Jesus, followed his instructions and were rewarded with a

huge catch of fish. Afterward, Simon felt unworthy to be in the presence of Jesus. But Jesus told him not to be afraid. Jesus had chosen Simon to do important work and he promised to be with him through it all. The same is true of us. We might feel that we are not always worthy followers of Jesus, yet Jesus trusts us to do the best we can. He trusts us to continue the work began.

Living the Word:

The right tools are needed to catch fish and people. What do you need to catch fish? You need a line, hooks, bobbers, sinkers, worms, lures, needle-nose pliers, a first-aid kit, sunscreen, a line cutter, a boat, and a fishing hat. What do you need to bring people to God? You need love, patience, and kindness, for a start. Ask your children to think of how they will share their faith with others this week.

FROM FR. TOM'S DESK

Fifth Sunday Ordinary Time: Rev. Anthony Marinelli, *Celebration*

More than any other Gospel, Luke's portrays Jesus as the one who is the "friend of sinners" and offers a message of divine mercy. Thus, his portrayal of the call of Peter includes this miraculous catch, Peter realizes that he is in the presence of someone extraordinary. His first reaction is that of being unworthy: "Leave me, Lord. I am a sinful man." But Jesus will not hear of this. In fact, this may have come as music to his ears. The religious leaders, the scribes, and Pharisees, are unaware of their sinfulness and their need of God's mercy. Being a sinner is not to hold back from following the Lord. In fact, Jesus' core message was geared to sinners, human beings whose hearts are always in need of a deeper conversation to God's love. It is not Peter's sins that will hold him back. Jesus sees the enemy as fear: "Do not be afraid. From now on you will be catching men." Those who would be reading Luke's Gospel would well know of Peter's significance in the Church. Luke's story makes it quite clear that the Church is meant not for the perfect but for those unafraid to give.

Two thousand years later, the call of Peter stands as a reminder of our own call. We may never be the Pope or a priest, but the call to follow Christ is given to each of us uniquely. One of the complaints leveled against Christianity is that it is unrealistic. It is very easy to look at ourselves and see how far short of the ideal we fall. It is easy to become discouraged with our lack of progress in holiness and in goodness. It is easy to say, as Peter did, "Leave me, Lord. I am a sinful man." Perhaps today's Gospel teaches us to see our sinfulness not as much as an obstacle as a prerequisite for following the Lord. It is only when we recognize our sinfulness that we truly see ourselves accurately. It is also only then that we can recognize God's love for us and his forgiveness. For it is only then that we will have the courage and freedom necessary to follow him.

Isaiah's Call (Isaiah 6): *Good News*

So, this is where the text of the Sanctus comes from! Yes, the chant of "holy, holy, holy" that the prophet hears in a vision, coming to him as the song of angels. Or rather, of Seraphim, the highest order of angels. It is the vision that Isaiah probably had while he was at worship in the earthly temple in Jerusalem. It results on confession, and commitment. He answers in the affirmative the same question which is put to us

Paul as Witness (1 Corinthians 15): *Good News*

There is no understating the importance of this passage from the apostle Paul; it is the first written account of the resurrection of Jesus. And remember, he himself is one of those witnesses, with his vision on the road to Damascus of the risen Christ in the heavens speaking to him. If we doubt the mercy of God, or the power of God to turn sinner into saint, consider Paul, who formerly was Saul and a persecutor of church. His life indeed turned around. We have heard him ever since in Christian assemblies around the world.

Call to Follow (Luke 5): *Good News*

Is all this a miracle story, this astonishing catch of fish? Or is it a sort of morality play, the lesson being that if one obeys God, and listens to the word, such a one will live and be successful. Not only successful in a material sense, with a big haul of fish! But with the satisfaction that comes from doing good work and God's will. Miracle or not, the story gives us Peter front and center protesting, just like Isaiah, "I am a sinful person." It is a confession we all could make.

Our Call: Rev. Ronald Raab, CSC, *The Liturgical Press*

Luke's gospel is a voice to lift the poor, those who struggle with life, those who believe that life cannot change. The presence of Jesus on the shoreline gives us hope. Simon and his companions offer new life to people in all forms of poverty. This is the deep water of faith. This is the hope for each of us. This is our vocation as the baptized. Jesus cares for each of us. We experience abundance when we live in Jesus Christ. Our worry can diminish our lives. Our fret shrinks our perceptions of life and one another. In these opening weeks of Ordinary Time, we see how the incarnation of Jesus Christ is made real in human life. Love is made flesh within every human heart when we have the courage to go deeper into the mystery of Jesus' care for us all. "Jesus said to Simon, 'Do not be afraid.'"

Shall We Answer?: *Grace Works*, Dallas Texas

Every person God is underserving of that call. Those who are called do not win that call as a prize for being good. In fact, one of the first impressions by those who are called by God is an overwhelming humility, a sense of their unworthiness, even their sinfulness. But God's grace is a powerful force, and it comes to each of us on its way *through* us to the world. Those who announce the Good News of God's mercy most effectively are the same ones who know in the deepest part of their soul that they have received mercy too. The one who is called does not strut, as if that call was an achievement. The person who is called is surprised by grace, and he or she never gets over the sheer hilarity of it all.


Is God calling today? It may not be for a lifetime service across the world, but just to cross the street for a single act of kindness. Just listen, especially during the interruptions of your life. If your heart's caller ID is working, you just might be overwhelmed to see who has your number. Go ahead. Answer the call.

Start With Conversation: *Good News*

Today, we are recovering the biblical awareness that conversion is for everyone. Like that life-long Italian Catholic Dante, lost in the dark wood at the beginning of the *Divine Comedy*—probably the greatest conversion story ever written—each of us at some point in our lives must turn around, which is what the word "conversion" means. When Jesus begins his public life by urging his listeners to repent and believe the Good News that God's reign is at hand, he is calling them to change their minds, change their hearts, change directions—he is asking them to think differently. He is summoning all of them to conversion, even, perhaps especially, those who are quite contented with their own goodness, those who don't realize that Jesus is talking about a life of compassion and self-forgetfulness and intimacy with God that is infinitely more demanding and more fulfilling than safe, self-satisfied, superficial righteousness. Even for the virtuous, the Lord's command to "take up your cross and follow me" entails a radical change of perception and direction.

Update for CMA...



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
