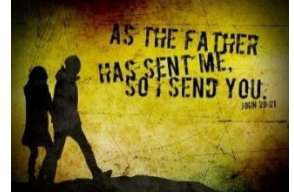

Can you say "Peace be with you" to individuals outside of church?

### Reflecting on the Word:

Jesus reveals himself to the disciples and immediately offers them peace—not once, but twice. How comforting that must have been after hiding in fear. Peace and forgiveness were so integral to the work of Jesus. Is it ever possible to attain peace in our heart, soul, and mind without both asking for forgiveness and forgiving others? What a crushing burden it would be in our hearts if we could not trust in a merciful God.



### Living the Word:

Jesus sent his disciples to forgive sins. Practice forgiving others and asking for forgiveness by making it a central part of your family's prayer life this week. Begin by talking with your family about how important it is to forgive others, and how necessary it is to ask for forgiveness when we've done something wrong or hurt someone. Remind them gently each morning and talk about it again before bed. Did they have to ask anyone for forgiveness today? Or did they forget? Did they forgive others when they've been hurt? How did it make them feel?

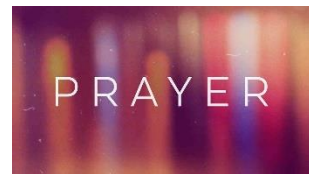

## FROM FR. TOM'S DESK

### Second Sunday of Easter

Some of the wonderous consequences of the dying and rising of Jesus are represented in each of today's scripture texts. As the Word and the gifts of Easter are proclaimed again in our hearing, so also is extended the invitation to welcome these gifts anew into our lives.

One of the foremost consequences that has come to us because of Jesus is the gift of being begotten by God (1 John, second reading). To put it another way, believing in Jesus leads to being God's children, and within this special relationship born of faith and sealed in love, believers are made capable of loving one another as true brothers and sisters.

In the very early decades of the church, however, and when the gift was new, those who believed and were begotten of God bore such a love for one another that it caused no little amazement on the part of their contemporaries. In today's first reading, Luke testifies to the ideal by which those early believers in Jesus tried to live. That they were not always successful in their efforts is admitted elsewhere in Acts, but today we are inspired by the quality of their communal life.

In addition to the gifts of being begotten by God and of sharing our lives together in Christ, today's Gospel reminds us that peace and forgiveness are also available to us because of Easter. The risen Christ breathes peace deep into our darkness and fears. We need only dare to inhale and surrender to serenity. Forgiveness, too, comes to those who repent, and it remains a life-giving resource to those who, in turn, will also be forgiving of others.

### Moved to Share (Acts 4):

*Celebration*

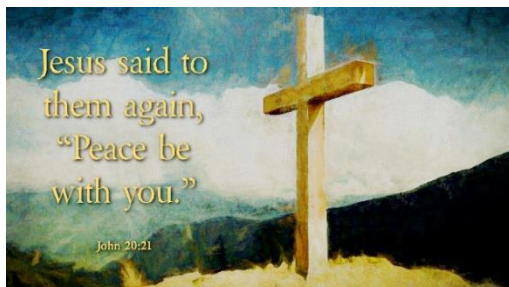
The quality of the church's shared life is evidence for the truthfulness of the resurrection. The most eloquent testimony to the reality of Jesus-risen is not an empty tomb or a well-orchestrated pageant on Easter Sunday but a group of people whose life together is so radically transformed and so completely different from the way the world builds a community that there can be no other explanation than that something decisive has occurred in human history.

### Love one Another (1 John):

*Celebration*

Notice the ancient author's insistence that to love God, believers must love one another, and to love one another, believers must love God. What prevents this logic from being merely circular is the author's understanding of the integrity and interdependence of the relationship between God and the believer and among believers. To separate or compartmentalize these loves is impossible because both spring from the same source—God's gift of Jesus Christ.

The author of 1 John also affirms that loving God means keeping the commandments of God, which, he insists, are not burdensome (v.3). Is this so because the commands come from God? Is this so because there is one who has chosen to be our yokemate in all our efforts? "Come to me all who labor and are burdened, and I will give you rest...my yoke is easy and my burden light" (Matt 11:28-30). Or is this so because for those who love, it is the loving that lightens even the heaviest burden?



### On being Sent(John 20):

*Celebration*

Those who hid behind locked doors out of fear experienced a risen Savior whose presence and whose saving death on the cross would make them fearless purveyors of God's peace and forgiveness. Those who had previously doubted would become the enunciators of the mystery that Jesus is both Lord and God.

Understand that the commissioning or sending out of the disciples by Jesus is parallel to the sending forth of Jesus by God. But no one can read the fourth Gospel without realizing that the relationship between God and Jesus hinged upon Jesus' love and obedience to God. Jesus was God's messenger, the revelation of God par excellence, because he remained perfectly obedient and loving. It follows, then, that the disciples of Jesus will find that their ability to continue his mission of peace and forgiveness rests in becoming as lovingly obedient to God as was Jesus.

But how does this growth in love and obedience begin, and how does it move forward to perfection? Just as he promised (John 14, 16), the Johannine Jesus breathed upon his own and empowered them by imparting the gift of his Holy Spirit.

### Purposeful Life:

*Grace Works, Dallas, TX*

Easter broke into our lives on Sunday, but its life and power casts light and life on every day of the week. We who are Easter people—who are children of God—are invited to communicate through our lives—could I say our lifestyles? --that Easter faith gives powerful purpose. Why? Because of all the things that human beings lack in their lives, the lack of purpose may be the greatest. Easter sets our lives walking in the direction of risen life.

So, what do we do with these Easter gifts in which we live? For one thing, like Thomas, we must choose to believe that Christ lives. To live in the love and life of the risen Lord is something we choose to do. When we choose affirmation rather than scorn, we choose resurrection life. When we decide to give generously of our time, our talent, our treasure, we choose resurrection life. When we accept God's gift of forgiveness and give God's gift of grace, we choose resurrection life.

So here we are, a week later, still singing our praise, shouting "alleluia!" What if we left this place and dared live the reality of Easter in radically winsome ways this week to the most unsuspecting people we meet? What if we choose to become the very Easter people God calls us to be? What if? Alleluia! Christ is risen!

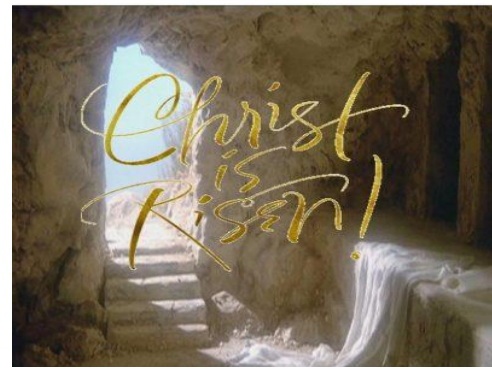


**CMA Update:**
