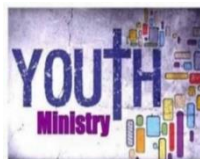
Living the Word:

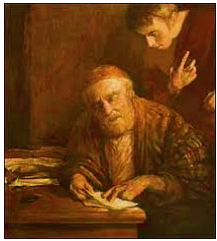
The Order of Christian Initiation of Adults (OCIA)

FROM FR. TOM'S DESK

Twenty-Fifth Sunday Ordinary Time:

Grace Works, Dallas, Texas

Jesus said it this way in our Gospel lesson today, “the person who is trustworthy in small matters is also trustworthy in great ones; and the person who is dishonest in very small matters is also dishonest in great ones.” Character is who you are in the dark when you think no one else is watching. But character is also forged in the small details of living life one moment after another.

Many of us think that our lives are defined only by the great highlight moments, those great mountaintop events someone has dubbed the “fifteen minutes of fame” each of us might have in life. But in truth, our lives are much more defined by the way we handle by the way we handle the small forgotten moments. These are the building blocks of our lives, and they set the direction of our character. Few of us this week will negotiate world peace, or discover a remarkable vaccine to heal disease, or rescue a life in dramatic newsworthy fashion. But all of us will have the chance to help a person across a crowded street, speak kindly to the person serving us at the restaurant table, read to a child, or send an encouraging note to someone who is hurting. None of these acts may seem like the stuff of a highlight film of our lifetime, but to God these are the moments that define a person’s contribution to life. Faithfulness here, where only God sees and only God remembers, is the crucial building block of a person’s life. And whatever great moments may come in that person’s life, it is these forgotten little moments that prepare the way.

So, if your life’s ambition is to do something great, or to become someone famous, pay attention to the smallest details and the insignificant moments first. So, aspire not to save humanity in general, but to make a world of difference in the life of a single person. And God will applaud, even if no one else notices that the world just became a more beautiful place.

Social Justice (Amos 8):

Service

Amos certainly addresses a situation in which greed and the desire for capital gain have the upper hand. The opening line of this reading makes it clear that the rich are so involved in economic exploitation that the poor of the land are dying. Even as they observe their religious rest from work, the rich cannot wait until “the new moon be over” so that they can return to their money-making pursuits. When they do return to their business, it is an abomination. They “fix their scales for cheating” by adjusting the weights (ephah, shekel) so that the balance is in their favor. Most heinous to Amos is the conviction that these servers of money ignore a central tenet of Israel’s moral traditions: the protection of the poor and powerless.

In Amos, poverty is a creation of the rich, an oppression by those who have upon those who have not. This prophet’s reading of the economic situation of his time may seem to us almost Marxist. Unlike Marxists, however, Amos’s vision is founded on the covenant with Yahweh. Yahweh expects members of the covenant to act justly with each other. The rich have violated the covenant by using the weakness of the poor for their own economic gain.

Good Christian and Good Citizen (1 Timothy 2):

Service

This letter was written by a disciple of Paul at a time after the great apostle’s death. It reflects a period of Church life when the intense

expectation of Christ’s return in glory was waning. Throughout the letter there is an expressed desire that Christians settle into the structures of society and gain respect for themselves as good citizens. As today’s reading makes clear, the author wishes that Christians “be able to lead undisturbed and tranquil lives in perfect piety and dignity.” In the inspired view of this author, our allegiance to both church and state are complementary.

Influence of Faith (Luke 16):

Service

In Luke’s Gospel the choice is over the use of wealth. Luke would here maintain that there is no possibility of remaining neutral in economic matters. As faith and money talk, one cannot sit back and watch, throwing an approving nod to one side and now the other. One must choose which one of these powers in fact rules one’s life. This is not to deny that believers will be faced with times when fiscal responsibility, wise investment, and financial planning will have something important to say. But in Christian living, faith must be an active partner in the conversation. Moreover, if the message of Luke be heard, when money and faith come to a standoff, the believer must be prepared to let faith have the final word.

Call to Action:

Grace Works, Dallas Texas

We cannot live as if there is no tomorrow, any more than we can live only for tomorrow. The master in this parable commends the manager for his shrewd dealings. Perhaps the master was pleasantly surprised to receive at least a portion of some stubborn outstanding debts. Or maybe after commending him, the master still fired the man. We do not know, and it does not matter. For the point of this story is not to entertain us, to set up the sequel of what happens next in the lives of the master or the manager or the creditors. The point of the story is to invite us, to warn us, to instruct us to prepare for our own audit before God. So, pay attention to the small things, the unseen things, where only you and God are watching. Do the right thing, every time, to everyone, as to God. But whatever you do, don’t just sit there. Do something.

Carpe Diem:

Rev. Richard Gribble, CSC, *The Liturgical Press*

The famous nineteenth-century American writer O. Henry tells the story of a little girl whose mother had died. Each day the child waited for her father to arrive home from work, for the one thing she desired most was to sit in her father’s lap and cuddle up to him. She was emotionally starved and desperate for affection. Each night, however, her father followed the same routine. He prepared dinner, ate, washed the dishes, and then plopped into his favorite chair and read until bedtime. When his daughter came to sit in his lap he would always give the same reply, “Honey, Daddy is too tired. I have worked hard all day. Why don’t you go outside and play with your friends.” The girl went outside and amused herself as best as she could. As one might expect the inevitable happened. As the girl grew older she accepted expressions of affection from anyone and everyone who offered them. Finally, instead of playing in the street she became a prostitute. One day the girl died from a drug overdose. As she approached the gates of heaven, St. Peter said to Jesus, “She’s a bad one, Lord. You know she was a prostitute and died of a drug overdose. I guess that leaves only one place for her.” Jesus, however, surprised Peter in saying, “Let her into heaven, but when her father’s time for judgement comes hold him responsible for what became of her life.”
