God does not ignore our cries for help or healing. Do you remember to thank God for his goodness to you? How can you show your gratitude?

Reflecting on the Word:

The ten lepers, in faith, called out to Jesus for mercy, and their faith was rewarded with physical healing. The only one to return to the Lord in gratitude was the Samaritan. His thankfulness for his physical healing leads to his spiritual healing. Through this encounter, Jesus shows us that no one, not a leper or even a Samaritan, is beyond God's mercy. Salvation is offered to each of us if we only cry out for God's mercy and respond to his love with thankfulness and praise.

Living the Word:

The word *Eucharist* means "thanksgiving." How do we thank God in a special way at Mass? Each night this week, set aside time when you can say thank-you to God. Have your children name one thing from that day that they are grateful for. In prayer, you might say "Thank-you God for..."

Growth of the Word (2 Timothy 2)

Celebrations

Even though he would soon be silenced, Paul was confident that the word of God would continue to be preached, for “the word of God is not chained.” In a homily on these words, John Chrysostom said, “For, just as it is not possible to bind a sunbeam or to shut it up within the house, so neither the preaching of the word...The teacher was bound [Paul] and yet the word flew abroad. He inhabited the prison and yet his doctrine rapidly winged its way everywhere throughout the world!” (Homily XVI). As Paul’s words continue to wing their way throughout our world, we, who are privileged to hear them, are to go forward with courageous, passionate faith.

Healed and Saved (Luke 17)

Celebration

Luke’s narrative offers a lesson on gratitude as the proper response to God’s many blessings. But that is not all. Luke’s narrative also affirms that the messianic blessings of healing and salvation were to be enjoyed by all of humankind, even by Samaritans, whom the Jews did not respect. Also in evidence here is the contrast between the many Jews who rejected Jesus and those who, though they were regarded as outsiders (e. g., the Samaritans), accepted Jesus and believed in him. At work in this text, as well, is the distinction between being healed and being saved.

The Samaritan leper’s healing had taught him a new way of relating to God. He became intensely aware that his life was a miraculous gift. He learned to trust God and celebrate every moment. Healing is salvation when we acknowledge God’s gracious initiative and when our response to that initiative is faith. Many who receive God’s blessings only take them. Others are led by them into a life of blessedness.

Gratitude is not just a social grace. Gratitude is a habit of the heart. None of us is our own source of existence or the source of all that we need to survive and flourish. All of life is a gift to us. Truly grateful persons acknowledge that they are recipients of countless gifts from others, from nature, and from God. True gratitude springs from that essential insight.

The very word “gratitude” comes from the same root as the word “grace”—gift (Latin; *gratia*). Think: “grateful”, “graceful.” In Greek, grateful is *eucharistain*—the word we Christians use for our celebration of the Lord’s Supper. The Eucharist is the ultimate act of gratitude, thanksgiving for life and salvation in Christ.

Gratitude enriches us: It opens us to experience the bounty of God and others. The more we become grateful people, the more we will find to be grateful for.

Twenty-Eighth Sunday Ordinary Time

Celebration

Obviously, the Quality of thankfulness that we are prompted to reflect upon today is more than a matter of mere manners. Rather, it is an attitude or posture toward God that begins with thinking and evolves into thanking. To put it another way, thankfulness is an integral aspect of the faith journey of the believer. Once Naaman the Syrian realized he had been healed by God, his gratitude prompted him to believe; to that end, he declared the uniqueness of God (“no God in all the earth except in Israel”) and was moved to profess his faith in worship (“I will no longer offer...sacrifice to any other God”). Similarly, the Samaritan leper, realizing that he had been healed, acknowledged the divine power at work in Jesus and returned praising God. Notice that Jesus does not praise him solely for his manners but for the thoughtfulness and thankfulness in his heart that had evolved into faith “Your faith has been your salvation.” Viewed in this way, therefore gratitude or thankfulness can be understood as an impetus to and a catalyst of our faith response to God. The more we think, the more we thank; the more we thank, the more we move toward and embrace in faith, love and hope, the One who is the source and the reason for our thinking, thanking and believing.

No reflection in thankfulness, as regards the believing community, would be complete, however, without focusing on our central act of thanksgiving, viz., the Eucharist. Therein, all our thinking, thanking, and believing unite with the saving action of Jesus; therein we celebrate who we are as a community in the company of all those who have gone before us in faith. Therein we lay the firm foundation of faith for all who will come after us, thinking, thanking, and believing in Jesus. Therein the leprosy of sin is forgiven; therein we are nurtured and made whole and holy so that we ourselves can become blessed, broken and given as bread for the life of the world

God’s Gift (2 Kings 5)

Celebration

Contemporary readers of today’s first reading can readily trace Naaman’s evolution from *thinking* to *thanking* to *believing* in the God of Israel. At first, a reluctant recipient of God’s blessing, Naaman had to be convinced that a God other than Syria’s and that a river other than those of his native land held any promise of healing for him.

After thinking about his options and the possibility of being made whole, he agreed to wash in the Jordan and, as promised(v.10), he was healed. No doubt, a certain sense of being humbled had entered into Naaman’s considerations. Humility was needed in order to accept the gift of healing in a way he had not expected and from a source he did not know. Humility was needed to accept the gift, not on his own terms but on God’s. At this point in the narrative, Naaman attempted to respond to God’s gift by giving a gift in return (v.15). However, he was soon to learn that God’s gifts cannot be reciprocated by any other response save that of grateful faith.

The gifts of God are not to be bought, nor are they earned; they cannot be had by bribery, nor can they be worthily reciprocated. Therefore, it is the responsibility of the recipients of those gifts to humbly recognize their dependence on God, their creatureliness before their Creator, their sinfulness before their Healer and Redeemer. That Naaman allowed himself to be aware his status before God and that he humbly admitted of his need is attested in the fact that his thinking and thanking led to his believing in God and to his expression of the belief in worship.


