Because of that encounter with Jesus, Zacchaeus changes.

Thirty-First Sunday Ordinary Time

Last week, we heard Jesus tell the story of two men who prayed in the temple area: One reminded God of his impeccable virtue and the other begged for mercy. That parable, like the story of Zacchaeus, is unique to Luke, and both portray Jesus' approval of transformed tax collectors. Jesus explains his verdict saying, "The Son of Man has come to seek and to save what was lost."

Today's reading from Wisdom offers an alternative rendition of the same theology with one of the loveliest descriptions of God we can find in the Hebrew scriptures: "You have mercy on all, because you can do all things." That might also be the most counterculture description of power that we will ever find. This indicates that God exercises omnipotence through forgiveness.

What does this have to do with us who don't expect Jesus to be parading down our streets anytime soon? In today's selection from the Second Letter to the Thessalonians, the author writing in Paul's name makes two prayers on behalf of the church: that the community be made worthy of God's calling and that God's will be fulfilled in them. Ultimately, those are one and the same thing, and they describe what happened to Zacchaeus.

In receiving Jesus into his home, Zacchaeus accepted God's outreach of love, God's omnipotent forgiveness. Zacchaeus' acceptance of God's love in Christ brought him salvation and would inspire him to continue in good works.

In today's first reading, the first-century-author of Wisdom invites readers to marvel at the care with which all things are made and to realize that such care is multiplied exponentially when applied to God's greatest creation, humankind. We can almost hear the reasoning of the ancient sage: If God is mindful of a drop of morning dew, How much more of mankind? If God's imperishable spirit is in things, how much more in humankind! Therefore, God is exceedingly approachable and available to the sinful- so approach and be not afraid

Second Coming (2 Thessalonians1):

When Paul first preached the good news in Thessalonica in about the year 49, he was avid in his belief that Jesus' return was imminent. His excitement is palpable in the letter he later wrote to that Greek community around 51. However, as time passed and it became clear that no one could be certain as to the time of the second coming of Jesus, Paul had to redirect his enthusiasm toward the manner-in-which believers might best live and work and pray as they awaited the Lord. Did his ideas change? Of course, and he adapted his hopes and his teachings so that the message would remain relevant to a growing church.

Jesus :A Pilgrimage

Zacchaeus clambers down and welcomes Jesus with rejoicing. Joy is a natural response to the presence of God. But the crowd doesn't approve. Why would Jesus want to dine at the house of a person who, in the view of some in the crowd, was the "chief of sinners?" Plus, Jesus doesn't wait to be invited, and he doesn't wait for Zacchaeus to apologize or make an act of restitution – he makes the first move with the sinner. Luke tells us that "everyone"-this would include the disciples --- grumbles... So, to the disciples' question, "Who can be saved?" Jesus answers, in effect, "Take a look at Zacchaeus"...

The story began with the image of Zacchaeus seeking Jesus but ends by saying that Jesus was seeking Zacchaeus. To find God is to be found is to be found by God, who has been looking for us all along.

We have come here today to get a glimpse of Jesus. All of us have taken time out of our weekend to hear his word and receive his body and blood. Each of us is likewise holding onto something that we must let go of if we are to stretch our hands out to Jesus. It could be an old habit or an unhealthy relationship. Our greed could be driving us to overwork ourselves and neglect our families. Or bitterness over the past could be making us unwilling to forgive others. We have to be willing to let it all go so that we can make room for Jesus in our hearts.


